

DRTHVIEW'S DEVOTIONAL

"Don't Ever Assume"

One word can govern our emotional, and our spiritual life: assume.

For example *assuming* a child knows what happens at a piano lesson, they become ill thinking they'll compete with others in the same room.

Or those who say, "I love you," *assuming* it will suffice for six months.

The same thing goes for *assuming* we know what an individual needs, whether they're well, ill, or lonely, but we never ask: And they're left wanting, disappointed.

And when using words like, righteousness, glory, good, truth, grace and etc., to children or adults in our teaching? Does everyone understand?

Then there's the supposition, "I could do great things for God, too, if I had the gifts of Nehemiah."

But Nehemiah sidetracked this one word, *assume*, by laying aside his gifts to God, and waited upon Him and His leading.

From the beginning Nehemiah met God on his knees seeking His counsel: "Lead me, O Lord, in Your righteousness because of my enemies; Make Your way straight before my face" (Psalm 5:8, NKJV). He wept over the devastation of Jerusalem's walls, but he never prayed, or *assumed*, answers.

And with each step, Nehemiah continued to pray, whether gathering materials, organizing the people, or seeking their safety. He didn't infer what the people did or didn't know, or need for their emotional stability, nor minimized their conflicts. He met them where they lived openly, and honestly.

Another lived this way: Our Lord Jesus. He too, never *assumed* the people recognized His deity, or the fulfillment of scriptures. But rather taught the people hope and guidance through parables using examples they could identify with and understand: "All these things Jesus spoke to the multitude in parables. . . that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet: *I will open My mouth in parables . . . uttering secrets from the foundation of the world*'" (Matthew 13:34: Psalm '78:2).

Nor did Nehemiah cast nets of invitations to the exiled people to: "Return home, rebuild your home, come worship and live out God's disciplines," No, he humbly put himself in their place: They'd endured, and traversed roads of hardship with formal worship excluded.

For the first time God's Word, normally confined to the private study among the scholars, he had brought before men, women, young people, and had Ezra openly read while the Levites explained. And the people lay prostrate, rejoicing.

Nehemiah became a precursor of Christ in breaking the separation between the people and God's word: One day bringing the final fulfillment to the prophecy they heard.

Fear, disappointments, frustrations, hurt feelings, misunderstandings and jealousy are the results when we elevate our *assumptions* towards others with what they need or have.

But feasting our eyes and minds on Christ as Nehemiah did with God, will bring: "The peace of God, [to us and others], which surpasses all understanding, and will guard [our] hearts and minds through Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:8).

FOR THE

GLORY

The untold and inspiring story of Eric Liddell, hero of *Chariots of Fire*, from his Olympic medal to his missionary work in China to his last, brave years in a Japanese work camp during WWII.

Many people will remember Eric Liddell as the Olympic gold medalist from the Academy Award winning film *Chariots of Fire.* Famously, Liddell would not run on Sunday because of his strict observance of the Christian Sabbath, and so he did not compete in his signature event, the 100 meters, at the 1924 Paris Olympics. He was the greatest sprinter in the world at the time, and his choice not to run was ridiculed by the British Olympic committee, his fellow athletes, and most of the world press. Yet Liddell triumphed in a new event, winning the 400 meters in Paris.

Liddell ran--and lived--for the glory of his God. After winning gold, he dedicated himself to missionary work. He travelled to China to work in a local school and as a missionary. He married and had children there. By the time he could see war on the horizon, Liddell put Florence, his pregnant wife, and children on a boat to Canada, while he stayed behind, his conscience compelling him to stay among the Chinese. He and thousands of other westerners were eventually interned at a Japanese work camp.

Once imprisoned, Liddell did what he was born to do, practice his faith and his sport. He became the moral center of an unbearable world. He was the hardest worker in the camp, he counseled many of the other prisoners, he gave up his own meager portion of meals many days, and he organized games for the children there. He even raced again. For his ailing, malnourished body, it was all too much. Liddell died of a brain tumor just before the end of the war. His passing was mourned around the world, and his story still inspires.
